

Samburu Handicap Education and Rehabilitation Programme Building On a Sustainable Foundation



Construction has finally started on two more of our cottages! As our long term supporters will know, SHERP is currently attempting to undertake major efforts towards self sustainability. We are slowly realizing this dream and this quarter witnessed the construction of the cottage unit pictured above. The income generated from these cottages will go a long way towards providing the children with a steady source of funds needed to pay for food, school fees, and other basic needs. **Wilde Ganzen, the Rotary ter Aar, Fnd M O Knip** and our sister organization **SHERP NL** made the construction of this two cottages a success. The project is nearly complete and will fully be utilized by clients in the beginning of November 2013.

When this cottages will be complete we will have a total of 16 rental units of different sizes. Currently 14 cottages are fully booked

and being used by clients. One cottage is dedicated to **SHERP** volunteers. The other 13 cottages give **SHERP 155,000Ksh** each month. Sustaining our future is our main focus at the moment and we hope to be self sustained in the future. Thank you once again **SHERP NL** for sharing this brilliant idea with us and supporting us.

A Reminder of Who We Are

SHERP is an organization devoted to giving children with disability the chance for a happy and healthy life. We support 104 children on-site with disability who cannot be supported by their families, and in total nearly 400 children with disability across the Samburu county.

We were founded in 2001 by Grace Seneiya, at the time a young Samburu teacher unable to live with the Samburu tradition that children with disability were, at best, looked after as a guilty secret, at worst, killed as being a curse on the family.

From humble beginnings where visually impaired students would share Grace's home and food, SHERP has grown into an organization that has given countless children a chance they would otherwise never have received. Many of our first children are now adults and are employed and fully integrated into the community.

Our quarterly newsletters seek to inform and educate our donors and friends about the work taking place at SHERP. We are attempting to document our successes, struggles and our need for your continued support and help, without which the remarkable success of the children here would not be possible. The children called him MATO. The Hearing impaired learners also had a sign name for him. He was so loved and adored by the children and the staff of SHERP. He was a friend to many people around Maralal town.

This young man **Martin Cooks** was assigned to **SHERP** for two years as an American Peace Corps Volunteer. He came to **SHERP** and did all a dedicate young person can do to lighten the lives of the children in **SHERP**.

Martin was a blessing and we miss him so much. He left a gap no one can fill easily. He introduced children to many sorts of social activities. Like the movie night, different games, the most amazing was a trip to Nairobi for some of the children, shopping and occasionally making chapattis with the kids. It was all fun having Martin around. He also played a very big role in the administration of **SHERP** daily activities which included counseling children/parents, community outreach activities, taking care of children daily needs, report writing (quarterly newsletter) and proposal writing. The most successful one was the Safaricom proposal that raised funds that constructed a big house that is now used by **AMREF** as their base office in Samburu County.

Martin was also a team leader for the other Peace Corps Volunteers in their region which describes Martin as highly responsible. We want to take this chance to Celebrate Martin and say **ASANTE**.

MEDICAL HELP

Njamano Lesepe was left in **SHERP** by two young parents who came to state clearly that they can no longer keep the child at home because of her severe disability. Njamano was assessed and was found with a condition known as cerebral palsy. Through a lot of medical, physiotherapy and special care Njamano can now sit by herself and she is trying to walk. Thanks to the support of our friends and donors who supported the physiotherapy equipment for exercise and special thanks to

Therese Smeets for her steady support to our small clinic which has been sustaining these children's lives. Njamano like many **SHERP** children who are abandoned by their parents strive to excel and we hope to link Njamano to her parents one day.

The **SHERP** clinic has seen many children live happily and we thank our supporters for the epilepsy medication which assists 28 children in our home with this condition. This quarter we managed to assist 17 children with different conditions for surgery. The many surgeries we have performed over the years have seen many children get out of disability and lead normal lives. The surgeries include orthopedic, neurosurgeries, cleft/palette surgeries, eye surgeries and many other forms of corrective surgeries. Every quarter we spend close to a million Kenya shillings to support the children from all over samburu county and the neighboring Marsabit county that are bordering our County. The surgeries would not be possible without the major support and dedication from **SHERP NL** whose donations have seen hundreds of children get their lives back through surgery.

At the beginning of this quarter, some children were taken to Olkalao to undertake assessment in order to be placed for surgery. Most of the time the surgery for one particular child can take between 2-4 years and **SHERP** pays for the child school fees and surgery fee. Olkalao offers children on surgery education as they undergo medical treatment. All the children we have taken through surgery come back home standing and walking. It takes along time and commitment to achieve the end result. Taking a child back to the parents after more than 8 years or so in a different condition remains **SHERP** major challenge.

With intensive medical rehabilitation **SHERP** has in some occasions lost a child. This quarter we are sorry to announce the death of Johnny Lemagas a child with along standing medical condition. Johnny died from a condition known as muscular dystrophy. We are happy we were able to bring a smile on his face for 8 years.

Update on SHERP's Special Art Class



For the first time the children of **SHERP** got a stand at **YARE** to show people what they are able to do despite their disability.

Whatever we sold there of the children art it worth (3850 Ksh) the money that we collect we used to buy more beads for art class. We also talk with people about us and what we are doing. The teaching level of our class is certainly not very high but we focus mainly on the happiness of our children. Whatever the children learn and what they succeed in helps them to gain confidence and freedom.

We wish we could teach the children more skill and would love to improve the way we teach and care for the children. Any support whether it by in form of new ideas, knowledge about special education or how to handle certain disabilities, would be more than welcome!!

Mike Nakilinga is a boy from SHERP, Mike who is visually impaired has been with us for three years and we have seen him grow into an exceptional young man who is clearly on the path to success. Mike is very active does not stay in one place Despite his disability, he moves easily and without fear.

He has a hard time settling on one activity, passes very quickly from one game to another and he is eager to discover everything. He takes object, and puts them in his mouth to explore. For some activities, such as peg board, we guide him to do by himself but he gets tired quickly and lacks attention.

Mike provides us with a prime example of what children born with disabilities can do if they are provided the same love, care, and support given to children born without such disabilities.
